Success stories highlighted should be specific, i.e., they should relate to specific challenges, actors, solutions, and outcomes and they should describe one compelling event or an interesting series of events. Stories can be of different types. They can show the impact of activities undertaken under RKVY, i.e,. they can describe outcomes and how these were attained. The story should illustrate the benefits of a "systems approach" in bringing about tangible outcomes.

(Please do not cut and paste from technical documents. Write in your own words. Convey facts, figures and implications of the activity with passion and enthusiasm).

- Title (Title should be precise and to attract the readers' attention).
- 2. Category-agriculture, horticulture, animal husbandry etc.

Please indicate the type of "Most significant achievement/success story" as

Some areas could be- Food grain production, agri-infrastructure development, livelihoods, value addition, additional income, fruit production, vegetable production, soil and water conservation, natural resources management, gender empowerment, innovations, youth in agriculture, Private public partnership for Integrated Agriculture Development (PPPIAD), etc. this list is not indicative and not exhaustive.
