# Minutes of the MEGHALAYA RKVY 2014-15 State Level Sanctioning Committee (SLSC) meeting held on 14<sup>th</sup> July 2014

Since the Chief Secretary was indisposed, the meeting was chaired by Shri K.N. Kumar, IAS, Principal Secretary, Fisheries Department, Government of Meghalaya. The Chairman welcomed all the members present and requested the Principal Secretary, Agriculture to initiate discussions on the agenda.

Principal Secretary, Agriculture made a presentation giving an overview of the RKVY implementation in Meghalaya for the period 2007-08 to 2013-14 involving a fund flow of Rs. 165.01 crores. He also informed that the GOI had allocated Rs. 64.77 crores under normal RKVY, Rs. 3 crores under NMPS and Rs. 1 crore under NVIUC for 2014-15. Hence, it was suggested that the Committee deliberate and clear projects worth Rs. 97 crores (150% over the allocation) under normal RKVY and projects under sub-schemes.

He also informed that the SLSC which met during 2013 had cleared projects worth Rs.222.36 crores, but that only Rs.34.45 crores was released by GOI during 2013-14, leaving a requirement of Rs.187.91 crores under normal RKVY.

Thereafter, discussions ensued on the 2014-15 proposals which are the spill-over of the previous year's approved projects along with a few new proposals.

#### 1. RDIVIS

Shri Sarvesh Rai, IFS, Nodal Officer (Meghalaya), DAC, raised the issue of the irregularity in the entry of the RDMIS, and which would adversely affect the fund flow to the State. The Committee, therefore, requested each implementing Department to notify one Nodal Officer to coordinate with the Nodal Department (Agriculture Department) on the various RKVY projects implemented by them so as to enable regular entry in the RDMIS and to expedite prompt submission of Utilization Certificates of funds received.

#### 2. Impact evaluation of RKVY Scheme

The Committee felt that 3<sup>rd</sup> party evaluation of the RKVY projects implemented so far is necessary so that the State Level Sanction Committee can suitably assess the impact of the RKVY programme on the enhanced agricultural production and on the socio-economic condition of the farmers with respect to income generation. In this regard, the Committee agreed that the responsibility to engage the agency be entrusted to the Programme Implementation & Evaluation Department. The expenditure involved will be met from the contingency fund under the RKVY(1%)

### 3. AGRICULTURE

❖ A presentation was made by the representative of NIPHM (National Institute of Plant Health management), Hyderabad, on the scheme formulated by them entitled "Ado₁ tion of Agro-eco System Analysis based Bio-intensive Pest Management Strategies and

Promotion of Decentralized Bio-control Agents and Bio-pesticides Production Centres through Farmer Self Help Groups". The expenditure involved is as follows:

The Committee approved the proposal, in principle, with the following suggestions:

- NIPHM to deploy 2 scientists in the State for capacity building of officials and farmers
- For the purpose of formulation of an Action Plan, NIPHM should conduct a base line survey to assess the local conditions, coupled with an economic analysis of the project
- To promote only registered Bio-pesticides
- Regarding the proposal for the Construction of Accommodation for guest lecturers at the IATC, Upper Shillong by MeECL, the Committee observed that while the facilities for guest accommodation is essential, the cost appears to be on the higher side and hence suggested that the proposal be reviewed and resubmitted.
- The proposal for Irrigation facilities was approved by the Committee, particularly in view of the erratic rainfall pattern, but with the observation that the laid down procedure for preparing of estimates should be strictly adhered to.

The proposal for procurement of power tillers was kept in abeyance till submission of the detailed report of the present status of all the power tillers distributed under the RKVY. A comprehensive survey should be done and a report submitted to the SLSC in the next meeting.

Regarding the proposal relating to the Farmers field School, the Committee suggested that it should be integrated with the scheme on "Adoption of Agro-eco System Analysis based Bio-intensive Pest Management Strategies and Promotion of Decentralized Bio-control Agents and Bio-pesticides Production Centres through Farmer Self Help Groups" to be hand held by NIPHM, Hyderabad. The Farmers' Field School concept will need to be comprehensively revised by the Agriculture Department and the utility of conducting stand alone training programme for farmers should be evaluated.

#### 4. HORTICULTURE

The Director of Horticulture presented proposals under the horticulture sector and responded to the comments received from the GOI on these proposals. He clarified that estimates for infrastructure proposals are based on latest Meghalaya PWD SOR (Schedule of Rates)

He also stated that since most of the crops in Meghalaya are organic by practice, there is a need for Organic Certification and Value Addition for more returns to farmers.

The Committee made the following observations:

- Organic Certification is felt necessary for vegetables which are for consumption and not for flowers, as the value addition of flowers is not known.
- > Converge Chow Chow cultivation with MNREGA scheme and expand to all districts of the State
- > Schemes for farmers and growers should be more market-driven
- > It was also decided that out of the 30 units proposed for tomato cultivation in North Garo Hills, the 10 units taken up last year will be evaluated first. A report to that effect be prepared and submitted to the SLSC in its next meeting.

For the multilayered cropping Arecanut should be substituted with any other crops viz; coconut etc. the Committee then approved the following proposals for implementation:

# 8. SERICULTURE & WEAVING

The proposals with focus on indigenous Eri and Muga silk, were presented by the Director, Sericulture & Weaving, who informed that all these proposals were recommended by the Central Silk Board (CSB), Ministry of Textiles, at their cost norms. He informed that, reportedly, Assam is facing difficulty in producing Muga cocoons due to the impact of climate change and hence this sector holds tremendous potential in the upper reaches of the State. # 10. SOIL & WATER CONSERVATION:

The Committee requested the Director Soil & Water Conservation Department to submit new proposals so that the same can be taken up in subsequent State Level Sanctioning Committee meeting during the year.

# 11. RKVY Sub-schemes (NVIUC and NMPS):

The Committee also considered the 2 Sub-schemes under RKVY, namely, NVIUC (National Vegetable Initiative for Urban Clusters) and NMPS (National Mission for Protein Supplement) and

was informed that during 2013-14, the SLSC had cleared Rs.2 crores under NVIUC and Rs.10 crores under NMPS, of which only Rs.1 crore was allocated to NVIUC and Rs.2.5 crores to NMPS (AH&V 1 crore and Fisheries 1.5 crores).

Hence, the spill-over is Rs.1 crore for NVIUC and Rs.7.5 crores for NMPS.

It was further informed that during 2014-15, GOI has allotted Rs.1 core under NVIUC and Rs.3 crores under NMPS.

The Committee, therefore, agreed to release Rs.1 crore to Horticulture Directorate for implementing NVIUC and Rs.3 crores to Animal Husbandry & Veterinary Directorate for implementing NMPS during 2014-15.
